

Greetings. I am continuing with a few articles about some of our “Church Treasures” or those members who have helped keep our congregation vibrant and strong. Last month, Kay Boyne recommended that I choose Anita Weinrick for my next article. Unsurprisingly, Anita was sure there had been a mistake and thought she wouldn’t have anything interesting to share. Right...uh-huh...I am in the choir with her and I know better. I assured Anita that I would try to keep our interview simple, casual and worry free.

When I pulled into her driveway for our interview, it was evident to me from the large boat in the driveway that Anita and Lou, her husband of 53+ years, were avid boaters. Anita says that from early summer to late September you can find them out in the boat 2 or 3 times a week. Anita hospitably greeted me at the front door and offered me a beverage and we walked back to a large room in the back of their lovely home. She told me she had relegated Lou to his garage workshop during our interview. When I sat down I could see that Anita had a couple of single spaced yellow legal-size handwritten pages of notes for our interview...a couple of pages turned into 4 pages with sideways addendums in the margins. This was supposed to be easy for her but she obviously spent many hours trying to be prepared. So much for me successfully putting her at ease!

Let’s figure out how Anita got here. From the 1880’s through the 1920’s, more than 300,000 Finns emigrated to the United States and roughly half of them settled in the Lake Superior region. Anita’s grandparents were Impi Marie Hytonen and Aukusti Vaisanen from Keuruu, Finland (above the 62nd parallel) just below the Arctic Circle (above the 66th parallel). From my point of view, Impi and Aukusti were seeking a “relatively tropical” island life down south on Sugar Island in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan (above the 46th parallel) when they emigrated from Finland. In order to assimilate, as was common for the more than 12 million people who came to America through Ellis Island, Impi and Aukusti chose to change their last name to Andersen. Impi was Anita’s grandmother but she fondly remembers her as “Mumma” (pronounced “moo-moo”).

When Impi gave birth on 1/22/1925 on Sugar Island to Anita’s mother, Irma, and her mother’s twin sister, Irja, (pronounced “ear-ee-ah”), there was only a midwife present. The twin birth took place on a very cold day inside a hot sauna. There was no hospital visit or prenatal care in those days. Irma was born first and carried into the house by Aukusti in a woven basket he had made himself. Irja was carried into the house in that same basket. Anita proudly displays that basket in her home today.

Anita’s father, David (Dave) Moon was born in Sault Ste. Marie on 10/5/1922. His parents were from Simcoe, Ontario. Since Irma was raised as a Finnish Lutheran and David had a different religious background, her parents compromised and chose to be married at Saint James’ Episcopal Church (our neighbor to the north) on 8/4/1943. When they returned from David’s military assignment, Irma joined the FUPC.

David and Irma Moon were blessed with 6 children. First is Gayle who married Ken Stevenson who is a retired Air Force veteran, second is Donna K. Moon who passed away at 1 yr old, third is Anita, fourth is Gordon D. Moon (deceased), fifth is Doreen who married Roy Spencer and they reside in Huntsville, AL, and sixth is Richard Moon (his wife is Wendy). Anita says “Uncle Richie” has always been the favorite uncle to all the nieces and nephews and can always make family members laugh.

Anita Moon’s home was always filled with joyful music and dance. She was taught to love the eclectic mix of many genres of music from hymns, country, polkas and a traditional Finnish song and dance known as Raatikko.” Anita’s mother, Irma, had a beautiful alto voice for singing. Amongst singing, playing piano, guitar, mandolin and banjo, the musical repertoire kept the

Moon household filled with “Joyful Noise.”

The Moon children were raised going to the FUPC Chapel on Greenough Street. Mrs. Moon was



one of the memorable teachers. Anita has fond memories of the annual Christmas Pageant and how the children all played a part in the Nativity story. Her words: “All the children had to exit the Sunday School wing and traipse through the snow and come in through the main entrance of the church - in a kind of reverent manner - and make our way up the aisle to where Baby Jesus was to be born. Imagine, if you can, the kids as sheep, shepherds, wisemen and angels walking up reverently. It wasn't really quiet, but it was spectacular! Lights were dimmed, a bed sheet was hung as a stage curtain, behind which was the Children's Choir. All the

pews were filled with the parents and grandparents of the actors.”

Anita is not sure if she was 11 or 12 years old when she sang her first solo for the Christmas Pageant. She's not certain about the song she sang (maybe “Away in the Manger”?), but she is absolutely certain that the piano player was Kay Jacobson (now Boyne). “We were both so young and we're still enjoying the “Word” through music to this day!”

She has other memories of her Chapel days including becoming a Sunday School teacher in her junior and senior years in high school. She is delighted that, on their shared birthday, she recently was able to sing “Happy Birthday” to her Chapel Sunday School teacher Audrey Bush on her 100th birthday. (See Audrey Bush interview elsewhere in this edition of the Chimes.) Anita also remembers the privilege of directing the Junior Choir at the big church. She remembers Brenda Eagle Ransom's voice as a notable standout.

Anita eventually became the Senior High Sunday School teacher at the Church. She taught on alternate Sundays in partnership with William

(Dyke) Justin. A fun memory was the Sunday morning after a Saturday night high school prom when every single student showed up for her class looking very tired. When she asked them if they hadn't been up too late, they replied, “We couldn't miss our Sunday School class!”

When Anita graduated from high school she attended Davenport College of Business in Grand Rapids, MI. She worked in secretarial positions until 1972. She met Louis (Lou) Weinrick at the Caramel Corn Bakery in town. They also occasionally met each other while “Slashing Ash.” As a relatively new resident of the Soo, I needed an explanation: I understand Slashing Ash to be the “tires burning rubber” motor event of driving up and down Ashmun street while the police pretend they don't notice as long as the reckless driving is controlled and only moderately reckless.

Lou and Anita were married 9/5/1970. They were blessed with the birth of Stacey Leigh on 12/23/1972. Stacey married Ralph Hale in 2009 and they have a son Owen (12) and a daughter Molly (9). They live near the “Big House” in Ann Arbor, MI (Go Blue!). They were also blessed with the birth of Patricia (Patty) Suzanne on 8/25/1975. Patty married Ben Palchick in 2003 and they have a son Aidan (17) and a son Adam (13). They live in Columbus, Ohio (Go Buckeyes!) Although she didn't say so, I am confident that there is no competitive banter between the Hale (Go Blue!) and the Palchick (Go Buckeyes!) families. In any event, the Weinrick family remains cautiously neutral...

An interesting FUPC fact is that Anita's mother Irma's memorial service was the last memorial service in the 1902 church before it tragically burned down in 2000 and the marriage of Patty and Ben was the very first event in the newly rebuilt church 8/16/2003. The first church worship service was the very next day.

Everyone knows that Lou Weinrick is an excellent mechanic. Anita swelled with pride when she told me that it was recommended to Lou that he apply for a brand new position that was opening at Kinross Correctional Facility (KCF) as the Automotive Instructor. He was hired, and over 27 years later, he retired. During his

tenure at KCF, he was awarded the North American Instructor of the year by Mitchell Automotive Manual Company. Anita has been grateful for the security that Lou has provided for his family with his stable career and talents as a mechanic.

"I was a stay-at-home Mom for the most part until the girls started school. We had the beach just 4 houses down from us, the woods out back, and time flew by. They started school, and I was able to work outside the home as I wanted, for a few days a week or every day. Eventually I made a couple of challenging career choices that I'll never regret. I was asked to apply for, and was then hired to be the Program Director of the Anchor House Campus Ministry at LSSU and our home became a blended family. I did this for 11 years, and as rewarding as this position was, it was time to delve into another challenge."

Anita inquired with Chippewa County Health Department (CCHD) to see if she was too old to become a Home Health Aide. She was assured that any age is welcome and soon found herself immersed in Hospice Volunteer Training. (Editorial Note: Emotionally speaking, this sounds like jumping from the frying pan into the fire...sorry...) After two years, Anita again went back to school at Bay Mills Community College to become a Licensed Practical Nurse. She passed her LPN exam and became a nurse at age 49. She worked in a doctor's office for 12 years and then joined Lou in retirement.


Anita and Lou have loved traveling with family and traveling to see family, and as I mentioned at the beginning, they have been boating enthusiasts for 53 years.

I am sure we could have continued for hours but when the interview with Anita was over, Lou showed me his marksmanship trophies and led me through his garage where he has an extensive workshop.

Anita has served the church since she was very young including singing, teaching, and serving on Session.

Anyone who knows her loves her. I think it is obvious that Anita is an invaluable treasure and asset to our congregation and I hope you'll greet her and thank her the next time you see her.

The Session members have been appreciative of these articles and so I have agreed to provide another article each month whenever possible. I have also been encouraged by kind words from many readers about my articles. I must admit that I started this task last summer knowing that if the readers enjoyed the articles that I would inevitably have suggestions from readers about other members I should interview. I tried to avoid this situation by letting each successive person interviewed choose the next candidate. Alas, this did not work as I had hoped. I find myself receiving many suggestions for other members I should interview. In reality, this situation is scriptural and why I am delighted to be counted and included as a member of this warm, loving congregation. Romans 12:10: "Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves." Indeed, every member I have interviewed has been a paragon of humility.

Last fall, two of our lovely members, Cathy Akre and Cheryl Thoresen told me that Audrey Bush wanted to pass on her compliments to me for the Church Treasures articles. Of course, they subsequently suggested that I interview Audrey Bush. Within a day, I received a follow-up call saying "Never mind, we spoke to Audrey and Audrey does not want to be interviewed."

During my entire working career, I have been told what to do even when I knew what was needed. I confess that I am a bit obstinate and willful and so, when I heard that Audrey had just celebrated her 100th birthday in December to become our congregation's newest centenarian, I knew I had to try to interview her anyway. It took boldness, patience and persistence. I decided I would "drop in" on Audrey at the Freighter View Assisted Living Community to introduce myself to her.

I had been told how vivacious she is for her age and indeed I was pleasantly surprised by her friendliness, focus and energy. We had a warm conversation and although she was initially dismissive of the idea of an interview, I was able to persuade her to think about it for a week or so. I made sure to call

her precisely at the time I promised to call her to ask her again. When I did, she consented to an interview later that day on December 27, 2023, but she insisted that it was contingent on me not impinging on her meal time! I certainly understand that sentiment!

Now, imagine, if you will, that you are a 17 year old graduate of the old Soo High School and you are on a movie date with your high school sweetheart at the Soo Theater (when they still showed movies...). Suddenly, in the middle of the movie...it stops! The theater lights go on, and a man in an Army uniform walks to the front of the theater and up onto the stage and announces that all military personnel must leave immediately and report for duty at Fort Brady and Coast Guard personnel are also to immediately report to their commander. The next day, you read in the newspaper about the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in Hawaii...but first...

Audrey Maxine Bush (nee Moore) was born on December 11, 1923. 1923 was the year when the sarcophagus of King Tutankhamun was first opened in Egypt after nearly 3300 years. It was also the year that marked the recognition of The Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) replacing the Russian Empire. Audrey was born in a building on the corner of Bingham and Spruce Street in the days before War Memorial Hospital opened. Her parents were married in 1911. Audrey was the youngest of 4 children. Her brother Guest was born in 1913, her sister Annie Orva was born in 1915, and her sister Violet Catherine was born in 1917. Audrey was the "surprise" for her parents six years later. She

has always lived in the Soo and when she graduated from the old Soo High School she immediately went to work for the Soo Hardware Wholesale company at Ashmun and Waters St.

I asked Audrey why Sault Ste Marie needed both a Soo Hardware Wholesale and a Soo Hardware retail store. She explained to me that before I-75 was brought into the U.P. that it was very expensive to have hardware brought to the Soo. She told me that the Soo Hardware Wholesale had bulk hardware brought to town on ships and then distributed to most of the U.P. Apparently the Soo Hardware Retail store was created simply to keep an unruly brother occupied and busy. Audrey spent time working in both businesses. When I-75 and the Mackinac Bridge were opened it lowered demand for a wholesaler in the Soo and the Soo Hardware Wholesale moved to Marquette.

Audrey's father was Camble Read Moore from St. Catharines, Ontario. (Although St. Catharines is now the largest city in the Niagara Region of Ontario with a population of over 140,000 people, Audrey remembers visiting when it was a quaint, small village.) Audrey's father Camble started work as a hay broker whose business "went bust" (her terminology) during the Great Depression. As a result, he took a job with Great Lakes Dredge and Dock company and spent the rest of his life supporting his family from a ship. That ship took him to any harbor or waterway that needed workers. The life of a dredgeman is a hard life and it meant that he was away from home every March through December. Audrey said she remembered that he was on the Tugboat Lyden for a time but she wasn't sure about the spelling of the name.


Audrey's mother was Leoma Guest Moore born in 1892. Audrey's mother was from Larch Township, Michigan which no longer exists but was southwest of Dafter, Michigan. Dafter eventually annexed Larch Township. Audrey said her mother was a wonderful mother, dredgeman's wife and a capable person. She managed the homestead and four children alone for 10 months of the year.

Remember the movie interrupted in 1941? Clarence Edward Bush was born April 9, 1921 and was Audrey's high school sweetheart at Soo High School. Clarence was drafted into the Army soon after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. He was deployed to New Guinea in the South Pacific to fight and serve during World War II. He was offered and quickly accepted the opportunity to become a typist at Douglas MacArthur's Headquarters in Manila, Philippines. Although his duties in Manila were far less perilous than "island hopping combat missions," it meant that he was not discharged until February, 1946. For five years, his romance with Audrey consisted of hundreds of handwritten letters while Audrey worked for Soo Hardware at home. Japan may have surrendered on August 14, 1945 but Audrey did not surrender to Clarence until September 12, 1946 when she married him at First United Presbyterian Church in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan with the Reverend Dr. John VerStraate officiating.

Audrey and Clarence Bush had 2 daughters, Catherine Ann Bush born in April, 1950, who lived in Florida until she passed away in 2013, and Janet Irene Gomez was born in September, 1952 and lives with her husband Robert in Gillett, Wisconsin. Neither of Audrey's children have had children. Everyone knows the expression, "You should not have to bury your child." Audrey quickly welled up and turned red when she told me about the passing of her daughter and frequent traveling companion, Catherine so I quickly changed the subject.

Audrey grew up in the First United Presbyterian Church and attended church at the Chapel. She later taught at the Chapel with Mrs. Hill, Mrs. Moon (Anita Weinrick's mother) and Mrs. Shadnows, among others. She has been an active church member for her entire life.

Audrey loves to travel. She has visited 5 continents and is not even sure how many countries she has visited.
